

World Encephalitis Day February 22nd 2024 is designed to raise awareness of encephalitis, an inflammation of the brain.

Our 10th annual World Encephalitis Day last year was perhaps our most complex to date - involving a media campaign which reached 111 million people and covered several countries, including India, the Philippines, Australia, North America, the UK, Germany and Australia.

It began with the publication of two new pieces of ground-breaking research investigating the mental health impact of encephalitis and included our spokespeople and members of our community who spoke about their experiences.

By talking about this to the media, our aim was to shine a light on the fact that these mental health issues can be preventable and, in most cases, highly treatable.

Neurological conditions result from damage to the brain, spinal column, or peripheral nerves. Some conditions are life threatening, with many severely affecting people's quality of life.

There are over different 600 types of neurological conditions:

- sudden onset conditions, such as acquired brain or spinal cord injuries;
- intermittent and unpredictable conditions, such as epilepsy, ME, certain types of headaches, or the early stages of multiple sclerosis (MS);
- progressive conditions, such as motor neurone disease, Parkinson's disease, later stages of MS or some rare nerve conditions;
- stable conditions, such as post-polio syndrome, or cerebral palsy in adults.

People living with neurological disorders usually have complex health needs.

pleasant comment, making me feel at ease before my consultation with my specialist. When one of them saw my date of birth on my notes she said, 'you don't look that old!' I felt like a new woman! I was asked what name I preferred to be called, my opinions were sought, I was listened to and treated as a person rather than just another patient. I survived the diagnosis!
