New Neuro Forum

The UK government has launched the first ever Neuro Forum to address gaps in treatment care in neurology.

Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State at the Department of Health and Social Care (DHSC), Andrew Gwynne announced the new UK-wide forum in late November 2024. He said it will work to improve care and support for people affected by neurological conditions. The forum will hold formal biannual meetings, bringing together clinical leaders, organisations and people with lived experience of neurological conditions. The forum is expecting to hold its first meeting in early 2025.

The announcement follows the long-standing 'Back the 1 in 6' campaign by the Neurological Alliance organisations from the four UK nations. The campaign called on the UK government to establish a Neuro Taskforce to address challenges facing people affected by neurological conditions. "The campaign was informed by the experiences of over 9,500 people who responded to the Neurological Alliance's My Neuro Survey. More than 100 organisations, including Essex Neurology Network, and over 19,000 people supported the campaign", the Neurological Alliance said.

The forum will "aim to drive real progress in areas where UK-wide collaboration is most impactful", the Neurological Alliance spokesman said. It added that the forum will drive person-centred care and "address unwarranted variation in access to care across the country".

The campaign also wanted support with problems including treatment and care delays, lack of mental health and wellbeing support and insufficient information at the point of diagnosis.

The national clinical director for Neurology at NHS England, Dr Niran Nirmalananthan, said: "Neurological conditions are the leading cause of disability and affect over 10 million people in the UK. This initiative brings together key stakeholders from across the UK for the first time, and aims to share learning to ensure patients receive the equitable care and treatment they need, with the goal of improving lives."







Rare Disease Day is an important international awareness day that takes place each year. This year, it falls on the rarest date in the calendar - Thursday February 29th. Rare Disease Day, represents nearly 300

million people living with a rare condition globally. More than 3.5 million people in the UK live with a rare disease; although rare conditions are individually rare, they are collectively common. Today is dedicated to raising awareness of the over 7000 rare conditions affecting people across the UK.

The Genetic Alliance UK will be publishing 'More than you can imagine: an anthology of rare experiences' as part of our Rare Disease Day 2025 campaign.

No Neurologist in South Cumbria

NHS patients with neurological conditions have been left without a specialist doctor across an entire region in England. There is not a single NHS neurologist, specialising in brain, spine and conditions related to the nervous system, across the whole of South Cumbria.

Ninety NHS Trusts in England provide a specialist neurology service, but they are not evenly distributed, leaving patients with no support or delays in referrals. Nationally almost a quarter of a million people are waiting for a neurology appointment, which is the third biggest backlog by speciality.

Dorset entrepreneur receives recognition as a disability champion

Sam Everard with ME/CFS has been named as one of the most influential disabled individuals in the UK by being included in this year's Shaw Trust Disability Power 100 list in the Education and Research category.

Sam is the founder and CEO of the Bournemouth-based charity SAMEE (Support and Mentoring Enabling Entrepreneurship), which is committed to helping enable disabled people to start their own businesses. She founded SAMEE eight years ago, and in that time Sam and her small team have built up a respected one-stop support shop for disabled people, offering self-employment guidance and mentoring.

Speaking about her award, Sam said: "I'm really humbled to be included in the top one hundred, but I am most proud about the disabled community that I represent daily. I know that they are all able to succeed if given the right support." _https://samee.co.uk

URGENT PHARMACEUTICAL NEEDS ASSESSMENT PUBLIC SURVEY 2025

This survey is being carried out by Essex County Council as part of a wider partnership of organisations planning for future pharmaceutical services. Completion of the survey is voluntary and if you choose not to take part it will not affect the care you receive from the NHS or your pharmacy/GP in any way.

You are invited to take part in a survey about pharmaceutical services (provided by pharmacies, dispensing doctors, internet pharmacies and dispensing appliance contractors) in the Essex area. The results from this survey will help ECC to understand how local people use the services, how they rate their experience, and what they would like in the future. These views will contribute towards the production of a Pharmaceutical Needs Assessment for Essex and assist in determining what services are required to meet the needs of the local population.

The current Pharmaceutical Needs Assessment covering Essex is available on Essex Open Data.

National Essential Tremor Awareness (NETA) month

The National Tremor Foundation (NTF) will continue to raise awareness of this little known condition called essential tremor (ET). March is a special NETA month, as they celebrate the NTF's 30th anniversary, and this year with your help it will be bigger than ever!

What is National Essential Tremor Awareness Month?

National Essential Tremor Awareness month, was started by the International Essential Tremor Foundation (IETF) in 2010 in the USA to raise awareness of essential tremor and has since been growing internationally from strength to strength. **Essential tremor:**

- * is considered as one of the most common neurological movement disorders.
- * affects over one million people in the UK, 10 million in the USA and millions more worldwide.
- * is a progressive neurological disorder. At least 5% of all cases of essential tremor occur in childhood.
- * is estimated that 60% of all cases are inherited.
- * is often confused with Parkinson's, although it is estimated to be 8 –10 times more common.

National Neurology Transformation Meeting January 29th 2025

Effective delivery of integrated neurology care requires a whole system approach. This is particularly important from April 2025, when the commissioning of specialised neurology services will be delegated to Integrated Care Boards (ICBs) across England. There is currently widespread unwarranted variation in the provision of neurology services (Neurology GIRFT Report 2021) and widespread inequity of service delivery. **My Neuro Survey** has further demonstrated that people affected by neurological conditions are subject to widespread variation in both access and experience of services. The full delegation of neurology services to ICBs will be in place by April 2025 but there remain questions without clear answers at present.

This is the second annual meeting and will be delivered by a partnership between NHS England and The Neurological Alliance. The meeting will focus on practical aspects of transformation of ICB commissioned services, and how we can collectively effect change.

The meeting will cover:

- An overview of how the organisation of neurology services will change in the coming years
- Insights from the national ICB neurology dashboard, and how we can use data to improve pathways and performance
- How we can improve unplanned and emergency neurology care in ICBs
- The role and impact of community neurology services in transformation
- Leveraging the voluntary, community and social enterprise sector in supporting transformation of local neurology services
- Sharing examples of neurology transformation within ICBs

The event will be held at the Macdonald Burlington Hotel, Birmingham and is intended for everyone involved in neurology operational management and transformation. It is aimed at Neurology clinical leads & neuroscience clinical directors, Community neuro-team leads, Trust service or business managers and ICB & regional neurology commissioners.



Neu Health wins award for digitising patient care neu health Innovation East and East Suffolk and North Essex NHS Foundation Trust (ESNEFT) won the Digitising Patient

Care Award at the 2024 HSJ Awards for their work supporting the adoption of Neu Health.

Neu Health are working to revolutionise care for people with Parkinson's Disease. The Neu Platform combines a smart-phone app empowering patients and carers and feeds into a clinician dashboard which utilises AI and machine learning algorithms to provide insights for monitoring and managing Parkinson's disease.

At **ESNEFT**, the Neu Platform innovation has:

- Improved clinic efficiency in over 90% of consultations, reducing appointment times by an average of 6 minutes.
- Led to care changes for 50% of patients, enhancing symptom management.
- Increased patients' knowledge and confidence in managing their condition.
- Reduced in-person visits through remote monitoring, resulting in annual savings of £2,000 per patient.
- * Achieved 78.4% patient uptake with over 600 hours of at-home testing.

The partnership was facilitated by Health Innovation East and driven by adopters and advocates, clinicians and patients at ESNEFT. The collaboration demonstrates how digitising patient care can reshape healthcare delivery, providing better outcomes for patients and staff across the NHS.

"This award represents the culmination of a massive team effort and the unwavering support from our partners and patients. We are deeply honoured to receive this recognition and look forward to continuing to innovate and transform care for people with Parkinson's disease and dementia."
